National Republic Registry is your solution to hassle-free, cost effective, online recording of public documents. The 24-hour information availability conveniently welcomes your information and provides simple to use search requirements in a very user-friendly environment.

Many inquire as to the validity of an online-based recording environment. If we think about it, what is more public than the internet? What is more cost effective; cabinet space or disk space? What is more convenient; online or on foot to the county? What would you rather deal with; outstanding customer service or opposition?

Below offers the definition of a public recording newspaper. National Republic Registry's existence was posted in Fort Worth Star Telegram for a duration of 30 days in an effort to publicly notice people of our existence and the opportunity to record recordings required to be placed in the public's view.

While National Republic Registry is not a government office, when National Republic Registry was founded, the goal was to provide first-class customer service and exemplify the entire meaning of TITLE 18 U.S.C. , chapter 101 § 2071(b).

Title 18 U.S.C., chapter 101 § 2071(b)

"Whoever, having the custody of any such record, proceeding, map, book, document, paper, or other thing, willfully and unlawfully conceals, removes, mutilates, obliterates, falsifies, or destroys the same, shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than three years, or both; and shall forfeit his office and shall be disqualified from holding any office under the United States."

Many local and state offices are violating TITLE 18 U.S.C. , chapter 101 § 2071(b) on a daily basis, with no regard to the very people funding their existence. So, we decided to focus on what we COULD do versus what we COULD NOT do:

Newspapers of Record in the United States

Because of the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, and U.S. Supreme Court decisions such as Near v. Minnesota, the government does not (and cannot) define certain papers as having a right to print, or otherwise promote, restrict, or license newspapers. Therefore, in the U.S. a newspaper of record is generally held to be any public newspaper that has a large circulation (in many states, public notices are required to be published in a paper "of general circulation" in the vicinity where the notice is being issued, such as the county or city), professional editorial and news-gathering functions, and generally unbiased/objective reporting.

There are provisions whereby a newspaper may file an application to be recognized by the local government as a newspaper of *public* record for the purpose of publishing legal notices. This is generally done for revenue purposes, as certain types of legal publications (such as fictitious name registrations, mortgage and trust deed foreclosure and notices dealing with a lawsuit) may require publication in a newspaper that is not merely a *de facto* newspaper of record, but one that has specifically registered with the government as one and been recognized as such. However, being a "newspaper of public record" does not make a periodical into what is known as a "newspaper of record."

In the United States The New York Times is a key newspaper of record.^[1]
